Charter Section 4.3

Proposed Bylaw on the Graduate Council

The Graduate Council shall consist of at least one representative from each school having doctoral programs. The College of Arts and Sciences shall have one representative from the Natural Sciences, one from the Social Sciences, and two from the Arts and Humanities.

The Graduate Council shall periodically review graduate programs to insure that the standards for admission of students, degrees awarded and faculty scholarship continues to sustain a quality graduate program. All regular faculty in a department or school with a graduate program are eligible to participate in the graduate program.

Charter Section 4.3

Outstanding Service Award

It was reported by Dr. Knoblock that the President and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, at a memorial service for Mr. R. Bunn Gautier, Jr., singled out the award given by the Senate to Mr. Gautier in December as being one of the highlights of his life.

Proposed Name Change for the Department of Anatomy and Cell Biology

It was *moved*, and seconded, to recommend to the Senate the proposed name change for the Department of Anatomy and Cell Biology to the Department of Cell Biology and Anatomy. The *motion carried* with one opposed and one abstention.

Status of Graduate Faculty

The Chairman reviewed the proposed charter amendment on Graduate School. Dr. Knoblock explained the rationale for the proposed changes. It was suggested that each department having a Ph.D. program, or terminal degree, shall elect from its faculty a representative to the Graduate Council. It was moved by Dr. Awad, seconded by Dr. Honikman, to appoint a committee of Drs. Clasby, Chairman, Yacoub and Knoblock to meet with the Provost to address the issue of electing representatives to the Graduate Council and to request Dean Ferguson, Graduate School, to defer action on electing graduate faculty members. The motion carried.

Matters from the Floor

Dr. Swan, Vice Chairman, summarized a discussion between the Chair, President Foote, and himself regarding the proposed educator faculty. Dr. Awad recommended holding any action on the proposed educator faculty legislation until meeting with the President at the Retreat. It was proposed that Dr. Knoblock serve as Chair of the group discussing the financial consequences of the legislation, together with Dr. Clasby, Chairman of the Senate Budget and Compensation Committee.

Faculty Senate Retreat on Budget

Professor Clasby distributed a draft agenda for the proposed Faculty Senate Retreat to be held during the special meeting scheduled with President Foote on October 23. It was suggested that because of time constraints the discussion should focus on Main Campus and RSMAS issues.

Proposal for Outstanding Teacher Award

Professor Knoblock reviewed his proposal to establish an award for teaching. It was *moved* and seconded to appoint a committee of the Senate Council to develop a proposal as outlined in Dr. Knoblock's letter for the establishment of an Outstanding Teaching Award. The *motion carried*.

Proposed Graduate School Legislation

Professor Clasby explained the proposed Bylaw on Graduate Council which generally reflects the distribution of graduate programs. Following discussion, the proposed language will be revised to reflect the comments of the Council and will be presented for approval at a later time.

Information Items

Professor Clasby distributed and reviewed proposed changes to the various medical plans being suggested by outside consultants and recommended by the Employee Benefits Committee.

Professor Alexandrakis reviewed proposed changes to the language of Bylaw 2.5.4, 2.5.5, and 2.7.3. It was *moved* and seconded to approve the language. The *motion* carried.

Professor Alexandrakis requested a variation in the procedures for evaluating him as departmental chairman. He suggested that the ballots be returned directly to the Dean's office where they will be reviewed by a sub-committee of the Council. Following the review, the ballots and all other material would be sealed and held in the Senate Office until such time as Dr. Alexandrakis ceases to serve in the Senate. The Council agreed to the request.

The Council met in Executive Session to discuss a confidential matter concerning decanal reviews.

In response to a query about the outside consultants' report on Administrative Services, Professor Alexandrakis stated that copies of the report will be available from the Senate Office. He stated that the Administrative Services Committee wished to attach the report to their annual report.

Bylaw on Promotion and Tenure

Dr. Alexandrakis reported that at a recent meeting of the Provost, Vice Provost, and Mr. Dee, President Foote requested that any comments to the proposed bylaw needing clarification or editorial changes be turned over to the Senate leadership for discussion with Dr. Sugrue and Mr. Dee. The President is anxious to sign the bylaw by May 1.

Charter Amendment on Graduate School

Dr. Clasby requested the Council to agenda the charter amendment on the Graduate School for the next Senate meeting. At that time he will present draft language for a bylaw on the election of the Graduate Council which provides for membership to be elected from each college or school on a proportional basis having to do with their involvement in graduate studies.

It was agreed that only two items will be published on the agenda for the next Senate meeting: 1) Executive Session; and 2) annual election of officers. The old and new Senate will be invited to attend the meeting.

Petition from Department of Politics and Public Affairs

Dr. June Dreyer presented a memorandum from the tenured faculty members of the Department of Politics and Public Affairs requesting an early evaluation of their departmental chairman. It was agreed that the tenured faculty members of the department, the Senate Chair and Vice Chair and the Dean should meet to discuss the matter.

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by the Vice Chair, Prof. Swan.

Faculty Teaching Evaluations

Prof. Swan summarized to the Council the discussion held with the President on faculty teaching evaluations. He informed the Council that most schools at the University hold regular evaluations. In the meeting the President suggested that it would be helpful if the Faculty Senate supported the regularization of faculty evaluations. It was moved by Prof. Yacoub and seconded to recommend to the President the written resolution introduced to the Council by Prof. Swan with some editorial changes. The resolution carried.

External Review of MFA in Motion Pictures

Following discussion, Prof. Swan suggested to separate the MFA issue from the issue on procedures to follow when evaluating proposals for new programs. He proposed that the Council communicates with the Provost the issue of the letters of recommendations of the outside reviewers regarding the MFA program.

Graduate School Legislation

Prof. Clasby informed the Council that he and Prof. Yacoub were working in the graduate school legislation. He asked the Council advise as to whether the Graduate Council members should be elected or appointed by the deans. After giving a historical perspective on the issue, Prof. Yacoub suggested that each school should have one representative and that Arts and Sciences should have at least two.

The meeting was adjourned.

Course Numbering System

Dr. Knoblock presented as a motion to the Council a recommendation from the General Education Committee with regard to the course numbering system. The recommendation included numbering remedial courses below the 100 level and setting University-wide standards for courses. These changes would be implemented in 1990 when the revised General Education Requirements are enacted. The Provost requested that a language be added to distinguish between the requirements for 400 and 500 level courses. The motion as amended carried.

Dr. Knoblock reviewed the proposed changes to Senate Legislation #87007(A) and agreed to make several recommended editorial changes.

Educator Faculty

Dr. Knoblock suggested that he request the Senate to grant authority to the Council, within certain limits, to act in the matter of the Educator Faculty.

He suggested that the Research Council meet with his committee to reconcile the two policies. Ms. Janice Hinds, Director of Research and Sponsored Programs, agreed to present to the Research Council the Senate Council's view that



SENATE COUNCIL MEETING

March 30, 1987

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 2:00 P.M. by Dr. Knoblock. Excused absences were approved for Professors Harvell, Honikman and Swan.

Preliminary Report on Ph.D. in Business

Dr. Randolph, chairman of the ad hoc review committee, presented a preliminary report on the Ph.D. in Business. He reviewed the schools' response to queries concerning curriculum, library holdings and the acquisitions rate under the Gold Fund Endowment, and the Provost's commitment to Ph.D. funding. He also mentioned the committee's review of faculty able to direct dissertations in each of the participating departments. Discussion followed. The Council moved into Executive Session to discuss the proposal further.

Revision of Charter and Bylaw on Graduate School

Dr. Besvinick reported on recent actions of the Graduate Faculty and the Graduate Council with regard to the Charter and Bylaws. The Chairman suggested several areas which might be included in a new bylaw dealing with the Graduate Council. It was moved by Dr. Yacoub, and seconded, to begin Bylaw 3.4 with a general statement of the membership of the Graduate Council and omit the first sentence of Section 4. The motion carried. It was moved, and seconded, to recommend striking "to determine eligibility requirements for individuals to serve on the Graduate Council", from the language of the Charter and that an appropriate section on eligibility requirements be drafted or a bylaw describing the Graduate Council. The motion carried. It was moved, and seconded, to repeal Section 1.7, definition of a graduate faculty. The motion carried. The Charter amendments, as editorially amended, will be placed on the agenda of the next Senate meeting but the bylaw will be deferred to a later date.
