Undergraduate Grading Report Fall 2014 – Fall 2015

Annual Report on Undergraduate Grading Prepared by the Faculty Senate Committee on Academic Standards'

Purpose of this Report: To provide a Faculty Senate sponsored assessment of grades earned by full-time students by teaching school.

Summary: The average grade point average (GPA) earned by undergraduates and new freshmen continues to remain steady. The range of undergraduate GPA is 0.52, with Frost School of Music the highest (3.66) and College of Engineering the lowest (3.14). For new freshmen, the Frost School of Music the highest GPA (3.73) and School of Business Administration the lowest (3.25). The retention rate for new freshmen decreased 0.5% while the retention rate for new transfers increased by 2.4%.

GPA Statistics for Fall 2014 - 2015 Freshmen and All Undergraduates: An assessment of the GPA statistics shows little variability over the previous years. As shown in Tables 1 and 2, the overall fall 2015 undergraduate average GPA was 3.31, and the new freshman GPA was 3.34. Table 3 shows the GPA results for new freshmen over the past seven years with little variability in mean GPA over time.

Table 3 displays the mean cumulative UM GPA for new transfers versus new freshman. As can be seen from this table, UM GPA for new transfer students continues to lag below the GPA for new (fall) freshman but has increased. Further, as can be seen in Table 4, the retention of new transfers is also lower than for new freshmen (92.1% vs. 89.4%) but represents a 2.4% increase in new transfer retention from 2014-2015.

Conclusion and Recommendations

Grading patterns have not changed much over the years, and new freshmen retention holds greater than +90%. The new transfer's retention rate has improved and is close to 90%. The new transfer GPA continues to lag behind the new freshmen GPA but is improving. It is recommended that the 2016-2017 Academic Standards Committee continue to monitor GPA and retention patterns to ascertain what might need to be addressed in the future.
