Proposal to Change the Name of the LL.M. in Ocean & Coastal Law International Graduate Law Programs March 25, 2015

Overview

The LL.M. in Ocean & Coastal Law is a graduate program designed to prepare attorneys to become specialists in the domestic and international legal problems associated with the use and protection of the marine environment. The program has a flexible approach that allows students to customize their degree to their particular area of interest within maritime law.

Name Change Request

The following name change, which has been approved by the Faculty at the School of Law, is proposed for Faculty Senate approval:

LL.M. in Ocean & Coastal Law	LL.M. in Maritime Law

The new name is all-encompassing and universally understood, and will help recruiting efforts both in the domestic and international markets. The main goal of this change is to be able to attract a wider pool of students seeking a career in the following areas of maritime law:

- Students interested in learning about the laws governing ocean resources along with their implementation in a global context, and who want to pursue a career path in public international law of the sea or work with a public agency.
- Students interested in admiralty seeking a career in private law, either in a law firm or working in-house with a shipping company, maritime insurance company or a cruise line.
- Students interested in understanding the competing interests of development and the protection of the marine and coastal ecosystems and who seek to prepare for policy-making, practicing or teaching in the marine environmental law field.

Program Requirements

As currently defined, the Program requires students to complete 24 credits with a minimum GPA of 2.30/4.0 and take the following mandatory courses:

- Admiralty
- Coastal Law
- International Law
- Law of the Sea

In addition, students are required to complete a writing requirement. Students with a foreign law degree also take Introduction to US Law and Legal Communication and Research, which are mandatory for international students in all graduate programs.

Basic Program requirements will remain the same, although the course offering is expected to increase by adding new courses that can be of interest to both JD and LL.M. students.

Admissions

Applications are accepted on a rolling basis through the year with a priority deadline of May 1st. An online application, an application fee, a statement of purpose, undergraduate transcripts, two letters of recommendation and a TOEFL score (for foreign law graduates) are required as part of the application.

Admissions requirements will remain the same.

Name Change for LL.M. in Ocean & Coastal Law to LL.M. in Maritime Law

On March 30, 2016, the School of Law submitted a proposal notifying our office of its intent to rename its LL.M. in Ocean and Coastal Law to the LL.M. in Maritime Law beginning in the fall of 2016.

The proposed name will be all-encompassing and universally understood, benefitting recruitment efforts both in domestic and international markets. The main goal of the name change is to attract a wider pool of students seeking a career in maritime law. Admission and curriculum requirements will remain the same as the current program and will not require the hiring of additional faculty or infrastructure resources.

Although a letter of notification will be submitted, the program name change is not considered substantive and will not require formal approval from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) in order to proceed with its implementation.
