The Faculty Senate, at its March 22, 2017 meeting, had no objections for the College of Arts and Sciences proposal to rename and revise the curriculum of the PhD in Romance Studies to the PhD in Literary, Cultural and Linguistic Studies beginning in 2017.

The degree will continue to require 60-credits but the original 15-credits will be modified from the original program as noted in the proposal. The revisions are designed to better prepare students for a career in academia, and develop advanced language, teaching and research skills that can be used in other professions, as well.

These revisions will not require the hiring of additional faculty or resources.

On January 27, 2017, the College of Arts and Sciences, Department of Modern Languages and Literatures notified our office of its intent to rename and revise the curriculum of the existing PhD in Romance Studies to PhD in Literary, Cultural, and Linguistic Studies beginning in the fall of 2017.

The revised program shall abide by the long established structure as outlined in the Modern Languages and Literatures Graduate Handbook, while implementing the proposed changes effective AY17-18. The number of graded credits required for the degree will remain 60 credits, but the program will be revised to better prepare students for careers as university professors and research scholars, and develop advanced language, teaching, and research skills that lend themselves to other professions as well. The variety of geographic, temporal, and theoretical concentrations will allow students to carry out innovative and interdisciplinary research projects, often with a transnational focus.

Proposed revisions will include renaming the program from the PhD in Romance Studies to PhD in Literary, Cultural and Linguistic Studies. The concentrations in Spanish and French will be changed to Literary/Cultural Studies and Critical Studies of Language/Linguistics. Fifteen credits will be modified from the original program as follows: 1) three credits in Critical Theory; 2) three credits in Critical Studies of Language; 3) one new three-credit course entitled "Dissertation and Professional Writing Seminar," that was approved by the CCC in Spring 16 and is already in the books; 4) two three-credit courses in a cognate discipline. Students who initiated their studies in AY16-17 shall have the option to abide by the guidelines in place at the time of their enrollment, or follow the revised program.

The program revisions will not require the hiring of additional faculty or infrastructure resources, and will be housed in the College of Arts and Sciences on the Coral Gables Campus.

Based on the details of the proposal, these changes are not considered substantive because they do not constitute a significant departure from our currently approved programs. Consequently, they should only require notification to the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) prior to implementation.

Proposal to amend the existing Ph.D. program in Romance Studies

Summary

After two years of program assessment and discussion among faculty and graduate students, the Department of Modern Languages and Literatures voted on November 16, 2015 to transform its longstanding Ph.D. program in Romance Studies (with concentrations in French/Francophone Studies and Spanish/Latin American Studies) into a more flexible, comparative, and interdisciplinary program in Literary, Cultural, and Linguistic Studies. The proposed changes outlined in this document are sustainable with existing resources and allow for programmatic growth in accordance with the Department's strategic plan.

The Ph.D. in Literary, Cultural, and Linguistic Studies will offer two primary concentrations: 1) Literary and Cultural Studies; and 2) Critical Studies of Language/Linguistics. Students in each concentration may opt to develop a secondary field of expertise in the other.

I. Rationale

- 1. By offering two primary concentrations with an optional secondary concentration, MLL:
 - a) maintains a foothold in the traditional field of Romance Studies while capitalizing on existing strengths in literary, cultural, and linguistic studies beyond the realm of the Spanish and French-speaking worlds;
 - b) adds faculty expertise in Arabic, Chinese, Italian, and Luso-Brazilian Studies to traditional graduate offerings in French/Francophone and Spanish/Latin American Studies;
 - c) creates programmatic flexibility to integrate faculty expertise and student interests that exceed traditional disciplinary boundaries;
 - d) advances UM's goals for hemispheric and global engagement;
 - e) poises faculty and students to address interdisciplinary topics of historical and contemporary importance to local, national, trans-national, and global communities (e.g., immigration; linguistic borderlands; religion and gender; diasporic cultural production);
 - f) trains multi-lingual graduate students with regional expertise and cultural literacy for careers in academic and non-academic positions.

II. Programmatic modifications

The modified doctoral program shall abide by the structure long established in the existing MLL Graduate Handbook while implementing the following changes, effective AY 17-18. Students who initiated their studies in AY 16-17 shall have the option to abide by the guidelines in place at the time of their enrollment or to follow the revised program. The proposed modifications to existing program guidelines are as follows:

- 1. The name of the doctoral program will change from "Romance Studies" to "Literary, Cultural, and Linguistic Studies."
- 2. The major concentrations will change from "Spanish" and "French" to Literary/Cultural Studies and Critical Studies of Language/Linguistics.
- 3. The number of graded credits required for the degree will remain 60. The revised five-year program shall include the following modifications and requirements within a 60 graded-credit model:
 - a) 15 credits in the core area(s) of research emphasis to be determined on an individualized basis in collaboration with graduate advisors. Areas of study might include, for example: Luso-Brazilian Studies; Caribbean Studies; French and Francophone Studies; Latino Studies; Maghrebian Studies; Peninsular Spanish Studies; Spanish American Studies; Transatlantic Hispanic Studies; Transnational American Studies. These core credits replace the area and temporal requirements in "French" (currently 12 credits) and "Spanish" (currently 15 credits) in the existing Romance Studies program.
 - b) **6 credits** of Critical Theory (rather than 3 in existing Romance Studies program);
 - c) For students in the Literary and Cultural Studies concentration, 3 credits of Critical Studies of Language/Linguistics. *New requirement*.
 - d) For students in the Literary and Cultural studies concentration, 3 credits in any Arts and Sciences discipline focusing on Colonial or Early Modern Studies (i.e. with a temporal focus on the 16th Century or earlier). New requirement.
 - e) **3 credits** of Dissertation and Professionalization seminar (course approved by the College Curriculum Committee in Spring 2016). *New requirement*.
 - f) At least **6 credits** of an approved cognate discipline (e.g. Philosophy; Film Studies; History; Anthropology; Theatre Studies; Classics). *New requirement*.
 - g) Optional minor concentration in Literary and Cultural Studies or Critical Studies of Language/Linguistics (9 credits). New option.
 - h) Students entering the doctoral program with an MA in a relevant field may petition to waive the Breadth Exam (normally taken in the spring semester of the

- second year) after the first semester of study. Petitions will be considered by the Graduate Studies Committee on an individualized basis. *New option*.
- i) Introduction to Second Language Teaching (3 credits). Existing requirement.
- j) Remaining **credits** for students in each concentration shall be taken in consultation with faculty advisors and in accordance with the students' field(s) of core interest.
- 4. Students who enter the doctoral program with an MA in a relevant field and an advanced research project may petition to complete a modified doctoral program of 48 credits. In such cases, the **15-credit** requirement in the field of concentration will be reduced to **9 credits** in consultation with graduate advisors, the Director of Graduate Studies, and the Graduate Studies Committee.

Doctoral Program in the Department of Modern Languages and Literatures **Proposal for revised text:**

The Ph.D. in Literary, Cultural, and Linguistic Studies offers two major concentrations: 1) Literary and Cultural Studies and 2) Critical Studies of Language/Linguistics. Students in each concentration may opt to develop a secondary field of expertise in the other.

The program is designed primarily to prepare students for careers as university professors and research scholars. Students develop advanced language, teaching, and research skills that lend themselves to other professions, as well. A variety of geographic, temporal, and theoretical concentrations allow students to carry out innovative and interdisciplinary research projects, often with a transnational focus.

Basic Program Requirements:

The requirements set out below for the Ph.D. in Literary, Cultural, and Linguistic Studies are minimum requirements. The Graduate Studies Committee, Director of Graduate Studies, and individual advisors may set additional requirements.

1. The requirements:

- a. for students entering on the "five-year plan" (with a B.A. or M.A., see below), passing satisfactorily a minimum of 60 graded credit hours in approved courses, 30 of which must be open to graduate students only;
- b. for students entering on the "four-year plan" (with an M.A. in a closely related field, see below), passing satisfactorily a minimum of 48 graded credit hours in approved courses, 24 of which must be open to graduate students only;
- 2. Passing MLL 701, MLL 711, MLL 714, MLL 799, and a minimum of 15 graded credit hours in the area(s) of research emphasis to be determined on an individualized basis in collaboration with the graduate advisors.
- 3. For students in the Literary and Cultural Studies concentration, three credits of Critical Studies of Language/Linguistics and three credits in any Arts and Sciences discipline focusing on Colonial or Early Modern Studies (16th century or earlier).
- 4. At least six credits in an approved cognate discipline to be determined in consultation with graduate advisors.

- 5. Nine credits in Literary/Cultural Studies or Critical Studies of Language/Linguistics, for students pursuing an optional minor concentration.
- 6. In addition to proficiency in English and the major language of study, demonstrating the following:
- a. reading knowledge of two other languages; or
- b. holistic knowledge of one other language (for example, by passing the equivalent of a course at the 300-level);
 - <u>Note</u>: Appropriate languages of study will be determined in collaboration with the student's advisors (e.g. students of Latin America may be encouraged to study Portuguese or an indigenous language; students focusing on early modern Spanish or French studies may be encouraged to study Italian; students working in the French-speaking Caribbean many need to take Haitian Kreyòl; etc.);
- c. if areas of specialization include Medieval, Early Modern, or Colonial Latin American Studies, students must demonstrate reading knowledge of Latin.
- 7. Passing a Breadth Exam. Depending on the student's interests, the exam shall consist of three parts, according to one of the following configurations:
 - d. one geographic region over three time periods;
 - e. two geographic regions over two or three time periods;
 - f. two geographic regions over one or two time periods and one area of critical sociolinguistics;
 - g. two areas of critical sociolinguistics and one geographic region over one-time period.

 Note: Students entering the doctoral program with an MA in a relevant field may petition to waive the Breadth Exam (normally taken in the spring semester of the second year) after the first semester of study. The Graduate Studies Committee will consider petitions on an individualized basis.
- 8. Passing a Qualifying Exam on an approved topic. The exam typically includes three general approaches focusing on:
 - a. literature, cultural studies, or sociolinguistics;
 - b. critical theory;
 - c. a cognate discipline (e.g. history, sociology, philosophy, law, art, film, etc.).
- 9. Successfully defending a dissertation prospectus.
- 10. Completing and defending satisfactorily a dissertation.
- 11. Satisfying the requirements of the Graduate School as stated in the Graduate Bulletin.

Basic Program Requirements (Text as it appears in the existing Graduate Bulletin)

The requirements set out below for the Ph.D. in Romance Studies are minimum requirements. The Graduate Studies Committee, Director of Graduate Studies, and individual advisors may set additional requirements.

- 1. The requirements:
 - 1. for students entering on the "five year plan" (with a B.A. or M.A., see below), passing satisfactorily a minimum of 45 graded credit hours in approved courses;
 - 2. for students entering on the "four year plan" (with an M.A. in a closely related field, see below) passing satisfactorily a minimum of 36 graded credit hours in approved courses;
- 2. Passing MLL 611, MLL 601, and a minimum of three graded credit hours in each of the following areas:

French

Middle Ages and/or 16th Century 17th and/or 18th Century 19th and/or 20 - 21st Century Francophone Studies

Spanish

Middle Ages and/or Golden Age 18th-19th-Century Spain and/or 20 - 21 st Century Spain Colonial Latin America 19th-Century Latin America 20th/21st -Century Latin America

3. For students whose focus is on critical sociolinguistics, a minimum of nine graded credit hours in courses focused on language analysis, and nine graded credit hours from any of the areas of literary/cultural studies indicated above, all chosen in consultation with the faculty advisor (18 credit hours total).

Note: Ordinarily, students will take at least two graduate courses in the MLL department each semester.

- 4. In addition to proficiency in English and the major language of study, demonstrating the following:
 - 1. reading knowledge of two other languages, or
 - 2. holistic knowledge of one other language (for example, by passing the equivalent of a course at the 300-level);

Note: Appropriate languages of study will be determined in collaboration with the student's advisors (e.g. students of Latin America may be

encouraged to study Portuguese or an indigenous language; students focusing on early modern Spanish or French studies may be encouraged to study Italian; students working in the French-speaking Caribbean many need to take Haitian Kreyòl; etc.);

- 3. if areas of specialization include Medieval Early Modern or Colonial Latin America Studies, students must demonstrate reading knowledge of Latin.
- 5. Passing a Breadth Exam. Depending on the student's interests, the exam shall consist of three parts, according to one of the following configurations:
 - 1. one geographic region over three time periods;
 - 2. two geographic regions over two or three time periods;
 - 3. two geographic regions over one or two time periods and one area of critical sociolinguistics;
 - 4. two areas of critical sociolinguistics and one geographic region over one time period.
- 6. Passing a Qualifying Exam on an approved topic. The exam includes three general approaches that focus on:
 - 1. Literature or sociolinguistics;
 - 2. Theory;
 - 3. A cognate discipline (e.g. history, sociology, philosophy, art, film, etc.).
- 7. Successfully defending a dissertation prospectus.
- 8. Completing and defending satisfactorily a dissertation.
- 9. Satisfying the requirements of the Graduate School as stated in the Graduate *Bulletin*.

Budget

The proposed changes to the existing Ph.D. program in Romance Studies require no additional resources and have no budget implications.
