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The Faculty Senate, at its March 25, 2020 meeting, had no objections to the approval of the College of Arts and Sciences' curriculum and name change of the Classical Civilizations major. The curriculum changes will include a reduction of credit hours from 30 to 24, while the name of the major will change from Classical Civilization to Classical Studies. These changes will also clarify the course students should take to fulfill the People and Society area of knowledge.

The objectives of the program and of the Bachelor of Arts in Classics have remain the following:

- to train students in the Ancient Greek and/or Latin languages;
- to educate them about the literature, history, archaeology, and philosophy of the ancient Greco-Roman world;
- to hone their skills in written English; and
- to allow them to develop a broad knowledge of the arts of language and the logic and rhetoric of expression.

Like majors in English, History, and Philosophy, majors in Classics go on to a wide variety of graduate and professional programs: medical school, nursing school, other health professions, business school, the arts, museums, and library sciences. Majors in Classics receive superb preparation for law school, become bankers and entrepreneurs, and work for both government and non-government organizations such as charitable institutions and foundations. Our program trains students to enter these fields with strong intellectual values and well-honed skills in expository and analytical language.

Student Learning Outcomes

**Student Learning Outcomes**

Language Competence: To complete the degree in Classics the student must gain the ability to read Classical Latin and/or Greek texts, in the original language(s), at either an intermediate (Track IV) or an advanced (Tracks I-III) level of fluency.

Cultural and Disciplinary Literacy: To complete the degree in Classics the student shall receive extensive exposure to Classical texts, both in the original language(s) and in English translation. In the process, s/he should also gain a solid grounding in the basics of the field, and a substantial basic awareness of several areas of the academic discipline: archaeology, philosophy, ancient history, and literature.

Written and Analytical Expression: To complete the degree in Classics the student must demonstrate the ability to read intelligently, to think analytically, and to write critically about Classical literatures and cultures. S/he should also have developed an awareness of how such knowledge pertains to any individual's metaphysics, epistemology, and ethics—in other words, how Classics pertains to living richly and as a productive member of society. (It should be noted that the Department of Classics has been collecting data for this learning outcome, now required under the new Advanced Writing and Communication Requirement of the College of Arts and Sciences, since Fall 2011).

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## Rationale

### Rationale

The Department of Classics proposes that the number of credits for Track IV of its major, entitled Classical Civilization, be reduced from 30 to 24 credits and that the name be changed to Classical Studies. The goal of Track IV is to develop a broad understanding of Greek and Roman antiquity by the study of its history, law and politics, sciences, art, architecture and archaeology, literature, and its reception and influence. "Classical Studies" is an appropriate name for this track, which goes beyond the ancient civilizations to encompass their historical, artistic, legal, scientific, and literary impact and legacy.

Under current rules, 40% of Track IV is language (GRE and LAT), and 60% is everything else (CLA). But our first three tracks already concentrate on the languages; Track I (Greek); Track II (Latin); Track III (Latin and Greek). We have gradually expanded the number of our CLA courses, with Ancient Medicine, Ancient Science, Women in Antiquity, Greek and Roman Law, Classical Art, Classics and Contemporary Art, Classics in Film, The History of the Soul, What It Means to Be Human, and many more. These courses, each with its special interdisciplinary component, have attracted students to Classics from other fields. However, many students who are in, say, a STEM major, and who would like to "double major" in Classics, simply run out of time in their undergraduate years before reaching the 30 credit goal. Discouraged, they settle for the minor and look elsewhere.

Therefore, we propose a 24 credit Track IV major. We retain a linguistic component by requiring either one course in etymology (CLA 210 The Greek and Latin Roots of English; CLA 211 Medical Terminology) or one course in either GRE or LAT.
